they can overlap
materials to create
interesting textures.
Move around the room to
provide assistance and
encourage creativity.
Step 4: Once the art
pieces are completed,
have students present
their creations to the
class. They should explain
the patterns they used
and how those patterns
create texture in their
artwork, relating it to the
Junkanoo theme.
Ask students to reflect on
what they learned about
patterns and textures
during the activity.
Prompt them with

	questions like: "How did your materials change how your patterns looked?" or "Which texture do you like best in your artwork?"
	4. Conclusion: Wrap up the lesson by discussing how patterns and textures are found everywhere in art and life and encourage students to look for them in their surroundings. If time allows, listen to some Junkanoo music and let students dance for a fun end to the lesson.

2. Group Discussion
Activity:
Step 1 : Gather students in
a circle and ask them to
share materials they
notice in Junkanoo
costumes (like feathers,
beads, and fabric).
Step 2 : Ask them how
these materials create
texture in the costumes.
Guide the discussion by
including how patterns
can add to the visual
appeal of textures.
3. Creating Art Activity:
Step 1: Hand out
construction paper and
materials to students.
Explain that they will
create their piece of art
inspired by Junkanoo,
incorporating patterns
and textures.
Step 2: First, encourage
students to plan their
design by sketching their

ideas on scrap paper.
They should consider the
patterns they want to
include and how they can
represent texture (e.g.,
using fabric for a fuzzy
texture or crumpled
paper for a rough
texture).
Step 3 : Once they have
their plan, students can
start cutting and glueing
their chosen materials
onto the construction
paper. Remind them to
think about repetition in
their patterns and how
they can overlap
materials to create
interesting textures.
Move around the room to
provide assistance and

	4. Conclusion: Wrap up
	the lesson by discussing
	how patterns and textures
	are found everywhere in
	art and life and encourage
	students to look for them
	in their surroundings. If
	time allows, listen to
	some Junkanoo music and
	let students dance for a
	fun end to the lesson.
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
